WORSHIP SCHEDULE

Sunday (2 Apr) marks the beginning of Holy Week, a time of special devotion remembering the events leading up the crucifixion and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. As fellow pilgrims, we walk with Jesus during the last days of his earthly life. At the beginning of this week's journey is remembering Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, during which people waved palms praising God. The events of the week quickly turn and by the end of the week, we listen as Jesus prepares his disciples for what is to happen during what is known as The Last Supper on the first of three holy days known as the Triduum.

We then journey with Jesus to the garden, where he prays for the strength to do what must we done. We join him in prayer with our own prayer vigil in the chapel, where the reserved sacrament to be shared on Good Friday, sits among flowers and candles on the altar of repose. On Good Friday we hear of Jesus' trial and conviction, ending the day knowing that he died for us. Our sorrows turn soon to joy as during the Easter Vigil (the third service of the Triduum) and then Easter morning worship celebrates the news of the empty tomb and Jesus' resurrection.

Please prayerfully consider attending as many of the services listed below that you can to deepen your understanding and gratefulness for all Jesus has done and is doing for you.

Fr. Tom's Tidbits

I would like to begin by saying I am sorry, sorry that we did not get a newsletter out during March. Between clergy retreat and the start of Lent, I did not have the time to sit and write the articles that share what has happened over the last month, and what to expect in the coming month. It would be a great help if ministry teams submitted more of the articles and pictures published. This way we might avoid this from happening in the future. Having said



that, between my upcoming mission trip to the Dominican Republic, and vacation, we could find ourselves facing the need of combining in May and June as well. However, if Jean has your ministry information by Thursday (20 Apr), she can pull together things together and have the Flame ready to go on time.

Working tougher is not always easy. We all have so much to do, our schedules and lives seem to be so full already. I recently had someone suggest our youth take on something we have before us, and I had to remind them that our youth, like us, have pretty full schedules too. Between school, sports, and those in their midteens work, their lives are filled with chaos as well. Add in they are often dependent upon the schedules of their parents, even when they want to do something, they often can't.

There's an old saying, "many hands make light the work". While not as old as scripture I believe its inspiration may come from the Apostle Paul. In his first letter to the Corinthians, he says we are all God's coworkers, working together, we are all God's field, God's building. He is reminding the people that all share in the work before them, that no one is above doing what needs to be done. When the task is big and overwhelming, pulling together a team is essential, and most would think of doing this quickly.

However, when the tasks are smaller, the need for more hands isn't something we immediately consider, at least until the stack of little things, becomes in itself, big and daunting. I know in my life that has been true. Add in a little thing called pride, and instead of seeking help when we need it, we drive ourselves crazy trying to get it all done. Mostly, things work out, other times we fall short.

How can we overcome the challenges before us, ask someone to help when its needed. I know, easier said than done at times. That is why, when we see someone struggling, we need to offer ourselves, to be the help they need. Since pandemic, with fewer people participating in community, our ministries have struggled. Some have asked for help and have found some, or all, the help they need. Others still are trying to work things out. Is there a ministry, or someone you see, struggling; one that you may have the gifts, or passion for that might make a difference? If so, please prayerfully consider approaching them, to see what you might be able to do to help them get through the challenges they face. Remember something Paul once said, the gifts we have been given are not given for ourselves alone, but to build up the body of Christ. If we are the body, then we have a responsibility to lift-up, and strengthen one another, in whatever way we can.

Vestry Meeting Minutes February 9, 2023

Vestry Members present: Fr. Tom Jones, Judy Darrell, Ken Gomeringer, Leslie Nutting, Kristi Smith, Michele Hagen, Margie Crawford. Also present: Barb Smith, Incoming vestry member and Carol McLaughlin, recorder.

The meeting was opened at 6:30 PM with prayer.

INFORMATION / UPDATES:

New vestry members Barb Jones and Patrick Howell (not present) were welcomed. Outgoing members Margie and Michele will pass on their vestry handbooks before next meeting.

Fr. Tom went over next month's upcoming calendar items. He will be out of the office on Clergy Retreat from Tuesday afternoon through Friday next week.

Treasurer's Report: Fr. Tom presented the financials in Marcia Adams' absence.

Budget vs Actuals end of year report: We are at 85% on pledges at this time. Some good news is that two new pledges for 2023 have been added since the annual meeting. This will increase our budgeted amount by around \$6,000. The budget will not be revised to reflect these pledges. Total operating income was at 113% which is great for this time of year. He briefly went over the expenses; nothing was out of the ordinary this month.

Changes in Equity report: Fr. Tom went over some of the fund expenses and income. There was nothing out of the ordinary.

Balance Sheet: End of month cash assets 243,251. Net cash assets 239,948. The temporary funds total is over \$111,000. Fr. Tom has been asked about the advisability of putting some of this into CD's, which will be looked into at some point. Total Available Assets \$663,026. Outstanding checks as of 1/31 total \$3,302.72. Motion M02-09-01: Leslie moved to accept the reports as presented. Margie seconded. Unanimous approval. Motion M02-09-02: Judy moved that we pay the bills. Kristi seconded. Unanimous approval.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

Trees, Shrubs and More came out to look at our landscape needs and will draw up a quote. The quote will include a tiered area at the back of the parking lot and new plantings for the circle drive area. Both of these will present opportunities to the Boy Scout for Eagle projects.

We need to look for a new lawn treatment service. Our current provider cost has increased and our discount is less. Fr. Tom asked for someone to look into this and get a few price quotes from other lawn service companies to provide the same or similar treatments we have been getting from our current service. Barb Smith volunteered to do this and report back by next meeting.

Our texting service ends April 1. There has been a recent increase in the use of this service, especially in responses to the weekly prayer request text. Fr. Tom wants to consider extending this service beyond the April 1 cut-off. It will put us over budget somewhat. **Motion M02-09-03:** After discussion Kristi moved that we extend the texting service. Margie seconded. Unanimous approval.

Spirit Hub Hosting: Fr. Tom distributed draft copies of the schedule and instructions to ministries for hosting the Spirit Hub on Sundays. This included expectations for before service, after service, and closing up actions. There was discussion of the expectations of the ministries, placement of the ministry signs, and what to use in the displays.

Fall Vestry Retreat: Fr. Tom asked if there were any dates in late August or Early September that would conflict with member's schedules. Leslie said there is one weekend at end of August that will not work as a class reunion is scheduled here. Also, there is mobile pantry on 26 August and 23 September so those won't work. No other conflicts were voiced. Fr. Tom will work to get this scheduled.

Electrician who did our lighting upstairs is going to bid new driveway lights, fix the loose roof heating wire, and run Cat 6 cable for the new camera system. Also, Fr. Tom was approached by someone in the parish who asked about adding a charging station for electric vehicles. This was discussed and all agreed that it was not feasible for us to pursue this at this time.

Fr. Tom asked around the table for other discussion items. Leslie thanked those who helped in the kitchen for the Annual Meeting. Attendance at the meeting was discussed. Nothing else was presented for discussion.

DECISION ITEMS:

Last month Kristi volunteered to look into the Icons of Transformation Art Shows which we were considering hosting at CHS. She contacted several churches who had hosted this and found that the \$2,000 outlay needed is only a fraction of what they actually spent on this project. She detailed all of her findings in an email to Fr. Tom, and he shared some of the details with Vestry. Kristi and Fr. Tom agreed that the scope of this project is beyond what our parish can reasonably handle and cost more than what we could obtain from a Bishop Clarkson grant from the diocese. He did ask for suggestions from the Vestry for other projects we could consider using this type of grant money for.

Alan Wyant did research on camera systems to replace our old ones that are at their end of life. He recommends the Swann security camera system, available at Costco for around \$900. This includes 8 cameras, our current system only has 4. **Motion M02-09-04:** Leslie moved that we purchase this system. Judy seconded. Unanimous approval. This will be paid out of the Building Fund.

Motion M02-09-05: Michele moved that we adjourn. Margie seconded. Unanimous approval.

Next meeting will be March 16, 2023.

CHS Vestry Meeting Minutes - March 16, 2023

Members Present: Kristi Smith, Leslie Nutting, Barb Smith, Ken Gomeringer, Patrick Howell, Judy Darrell, Fr. Tom.

Fr. Tom opened our meeting with prayer and welcomes both Patrick and Barb to the Vestry. Discusses the use of VPOD keys and where the keys give them access.

INFORMATION/UPDATES

A brief look was given to upcoming parish events. Fr. Tom would like to perform a brief ceremony on March 26th for the installation of Vestry members and notes that the youth group invites everyone to join them for palm cross folding.

Fr. Tom offers finance report as neither the Treasurer nor Jr Warden were present. Pledge giving was up this month as some members made their full year contribution. Expenses were also a little higher this month due to quarterly and semi-annual payments were made. Also noted was an increase in the number of pledges offered over an above the 2023 budget. Minimal fund expenditures took place in February. The most notable were Valentine's Extravaganza and Building Fund expenditures. The building fund expenses included the new dishwasher, a new coffee pot for the office, and a repair needed for the organ. The Endowment report showed a decrease of \$7521. Leslie moved and Kristi seconded that the reports be approved as presented. **Motion 03-16-01** passed by unanimous consent. Ken moved and Judy seconded that March bills be paid. **Motion 03-16-02** passed by unanimous consent.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

Barb provided us an update on bids requested for lawn treatments. While all offers were higher than desired, two offers showed promise. Following discussion, it was decided that Barb would contact both companies to see if there is any additional discounting they can offer. Final decision to be made at the next Vestry meeting based on follow up being conducted.

Fr Tom noted bids have been requested to run Cat 5/6 wiring for the new camera system, the repair of the circular drive lighting and roof heating cables. Also, as requested by a parishioner, Fr Tom discussed the possibility of adding a charging station for members and as a community service, and it was determined the cost for that project makes it unfeasible at this time. We expect the bids to be submitted before the next meeting.

The Vestry discussed The Spirit Hub ministry coordination underway. There has been some pushback from ministries as many members of our parish are on more than one ministry. As this is an important change to improve our welcoming atmosphere and parish communications it was agreed that since almost all the ministries were in favor of this program, we would move forward. Fr. Tom would have Jean send out the first dates to ministry team leaders, requesting the names of individuals who would serve beginning Sunday, May 7th.

Fr. Tom told the Vestry we might have a diaconal intern joining us later this Spring. The individual will be visiting CHS in the near future. A final decision on their placement will be made by the bishop in the near future.

Fr. Tom presented a possible ministry opportunity the bishop asked us to consider. With the Sudanese ministry at All Saints dissolving, he asked if there might be a possibility to begin one in our part of town. Several concerns were raised that would need to be addressed should the bishop ask us to move forward with this ministry, but none that were raised seemed to be overwhelming obstacles as they have been addressed and managed by other parishes in the past. Fr. Tom will pass our general thoughts to the bishop. This ministry opportunity was tabled for the time being until more direction and offered from the diocese.

DECSION ITEMS:

First item on the agenda was the election of new officers. Ken Gomeringer and Cindy Pekarek were elected by ballot at the Annual Parish Meeting. Marcia Adams was nominated to serve another year as Treasurer and Leslie as Clerk. No other nominations were made, the Vestry voted and both were elected by the Vestry to serve in those positions until March of 2024.

2022 Parochial Report. Fr. Tom presented the report we submit to the Diocese and National Church. This report

included the financial status of the parish and a summary of services and participation over the last year. With no recommended changes, Sr. Warden, Clerk and Fr. Tom signed the report. Diocese to be notified report has been finalized.

Jani King Contract. As previously discussed, Jani King had requested a larger than expected increase for their services. After further discussion, Fr. Tom was able to reduce the increase by one-half. The Vestry Clerk signed the new contract, and it will be forwarded to Jani King.

DioNeb Initiative. A brief discussion was held about an agreement the diocese is entering into with a 5G internet provider. The agreement would allow the company to install antennas on roofs of church property. Parishes were given an opt-in form that would allow the parish to be evaluated for possible installation. Parishes could refuse if they did not want to be considered. As there is a fiscal consideration if selected, the Vestry decided to opt-in acknowledging that we may or not be selected for future, but if we are not evaluated, we would not be eligible for a possible additional income source. Fr. Tom signed on behalf of the Vestry. Form to returned to the diocese.

Judy motioned and Kristi seconded a motion to adjourn. **Motion 03-16-03** approved unanimously.
