



Deacons Corner

In 2025 I read (actually listened) to the entire Bible this year I enjoyed a podcast by Roman Catholic priest Fr. Mike Schmitz. For years, Fr. Mike has read several chapters from the Bible based on Ascension Press's Bible in a Year chronological plan. Fr. Schmitz has also offered commentary and prayer each day.

There were times where I would miss a day – sometimes several in a row – and would have to make them up by listening to two (or three) podcasts in one day. The podcasts average about 20+ minutes. I don't think they ever were over 30 minutes so I was able to find time each day to listen.



My experience of working towards this daily discipline was hard some of the time. I found it insightful all of the time. I also found that sometimes I felt God's presence more than others. The difference between the time I felt closer to God, or didn't, always had to do with how focused I was on what I was hearing.

I find that, for me, feeling the presence of God always has to do with my focus. I've discovered that the feeling of God's presence, or lack thereof, can change while in church services, in prayer, while studying the lectionary, or just about anything.

When praying in the garden of Gethsamane, Jesus asked his disciples "Could you not stay awake with me for one hour?" Matthew 26:40. Sometimes, I know I should be chided too because I can struggle with just 20 minutes. However, I also know that I get to try again, and again, and again.

Rather than entering 2026 with a resolution, I will be entering it with an intention. My intention will be to work toward being more present with God. I will again be listening to the Bible in a year and this time, I will be journaling what I am hearing and any reflections I may have.

As always, I invite you to join me. Join me in living with more intention in any form that helps you be more present with God as God is always present with us.

Do Something New in the New Year: Serve as a Lay Eucharistic Minister

Liturgical Ministers As we step into a new year together, many of us are called to deepen our faith and find new ways to serve. One opportunity is the ministry of the Lay Eucharistic Minister (LEM) — a calling rooted in illuminating God's word, leading prayer and sharing God's love with our parishioners.

 Our LEMs serve in meaningful ways during worship. They proclaim God's Word by reading the Old Testament lesson, the Psalm, and the Epistle. They help lead the congregation in the Prayers of the People, inviting our community to lift our joys and sorrows before God. And during Communion, they assist the clergy in offering the wine (or grape juice) as Christ's gift of grace to all.

This is not simply "helping out." It is a sacred ministry. LEMs help hold the rhythm of worship, supporting us in Scripture, prayer, and sacrament. Training and mentorship is provided, support is ongoing, and no one is expected to be perfect. What matters most is a willing heart, care for our congregation, and a desire to grow closer to God.

Longest Night:

The Longest Night of the Year in our hemisphere is December 21st. For those struggling with homelessness and related issues, December 21st can be one of the most difficult nights to survive.

Magdalene Omaha (MO), a treatment facility for those who have been trafficked, held its 4th Annual “The Longest Night” vigil on December 21, 2025. The goal of the vigil is to raise awareness of the issue of trafficking in Omaha, raise funds for its survivor programs, and to be a light in the darkness for those still being trafficked. In last month’s Flame, I shared that members of our Journeys youth group and their parents committed to standing outside for two hours in support of Magdalene Omaha, its mission, and be lights for those still in the darkness.



I’m delighted to say that the six members of Journeys followed through on their commitment as did seven parents. Mother Margaret and I joined in the event as well. At a minimum, it was inspiring to watch those who participated shine the Light of Christ on everyone their and to hold those still suffering in their hearts.



The survivors and staff at Magdalene Omaha were very hospitable and although the night had a bitter wind, MO offered handwarmers, warm food and drink and a lot of great fellowship that helped make the evening a bit more bearable. It was not lost on us, however, that there are many still being bought and sold and it is often the only way they can stay warm.

At the end of the evening, many participants paused to write a reflection of their experience and to post it on a wall in MO’s facility. One staff member commented that in the wee hours of the morning, when cold and tired, those reflections would provide her with inspiration to keep going.

The group from CHS has decided to participate in the vigil again next year and is considering what more it can do. Members and friends of CHS will be invited to join us again in 2026.

Copier Replacement / Lease The vestry received a presentation regarding replacing the church copier due to incompatibility and support limitations. A lease option was reviewed, including delivery, set-up, training, and network installation.
