

WORSHIP & LITURGY

At Church of the Holy Spirit

The 1979 Book of Common Prayer is the form and guide for services. Holy Eucharist is offered:

- Saturday at 5:00 PM in our Chapel
- Sunday at 8:00 AM in our Chapel
- Sunday at 9:30 AM in our Sanctuary
- Wednesday at 9:30 AM in our Chapel.

Attendance at weekend services averages ninety worshippers.

The "flavor" of our worship is orderly, but we appreciate humor, the laughter of children, and a wee bit of innovation. We have strong lay participation in all our services.

The 8 AM Sunday service is held in the Chapel and is a Rite I service.

The 9:30 AM Sunday Holy Eucharist is held in the Sanctuary, Rite 2, with music and a procession. Our CHS youth provide a crucifer and the torchbearers. Music includes piano/organ accompaniment, vocal choir, and occasional handbell choir. The 1982 Hymnal is supplemented with Wonder, Love, and Praise, plus the CHS Songbook, produced in the parish and including favorite gospel hymns and songs. Incense may be used on festive occasions. Homilies are offered by our Deacons, The Rev. Deacon Ted Powell, and the Rev. Deacon Terri Storm, as well as our Rector. The service is broadcast on Facebook and is available as a recorded service on our You Tube channel (CHS1305).



Besides the traditional Sunday services, we hold a service at 9:30 AM Wednesday morning, Rite 2, and 5 PM Saturday evening, Rite 2 with healing.

Our final weekly faith offering is a service of Compline held online Wednesday evenings at 8 PM. This service is conducted by our Journey to Adulthood group.

Serving our Parish: Serving within our community takes many forms. We have a variety of teams that do this or that, all working together to share God's love with both members and guests alike. Our ministry teams offer a wide variety of ways for a person to use their gifts, talents, and passions to meet the needs of those people they serve because we know that if someone is doing something they truly enjoy, it is not just something they do, but part of who they are.

WORSHIP & LITURGY

Acolytes: At Church of the Holy Spirit, we believe that the foundation we lay early in life provides us with a structure to build on and return to later in life. For this reason. CHS encourages our youth to be active in the worship services of our parish. Our acolyte program is one of several programs offered at CHS that provides boys and girls nine years old and older an excellent way to grow into their own ministry within the life of the Church. While our youth comprise many of our acolytes, this program is also open to adults (both young adults and those who are young at heart) who desire to participate in a ministry of service that helps lead the faithful in their worship of God. Acolytes participate in all Sunday Services on a rotating basis, approximately once per month. Acolytes may also volunteer to serve at weddings, baptisms, and funerals, plus other special liturgies.

Lay Eucharist Ministers and Lectors: Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) read the scripture lessons during the Saturday evening and Sunday morning services and are licensed to help distribute the wine during Holy Communion. When serving at a service, LEM's robe in white Albs and serve throughout the entire liturgy: entering at the beginning of the service as part of the entry processional, sitting in the chancel area throughout the service, reading the assigned lessons and prayers, helping to distribute the wine during communion at the altar, and then exiting in the procession at the end of the service. Any member of CHS, over the age of 16, is welcome to join this ministry team. We are always glad to welcome new members.

Choir: Make a joyful noise! The choir sings regularly during our 9:30 AM Sunday Eucharist between Sep and May, and for special liturgies during the year. This friendly group of folks doesn't require auditions and will welcome you even if you aren't an opera star! Rehearsals are held prior to the Sunday service, from 8:45-9:15 AM in the sanctuary. Just come on up and join them if you are interested.

Altar Guild: A volunteer group of the parish whose ministry is to care for the altar, vestments, vessels, and altar linens of the parish. Altar Guild members prepare the sanctuary for weekly services, weddings, baptisms, funerals, and special occasions and clean up afterwards. Altar Guild members frequently supervise the decoration of the sanctuary with flowers. Members work in teams that serve on a rotational basis. The guild is open to anyone 13 years old and older.















WORSHIP & LITURGY

Bell Choir: Music is a very important part of our worship. We are blessed to enjoy the ministry of our adult and children's bell choirs, not only during the major events in the life of our community, but also at other times throughout the year. Our Adult bell choir practices most Sundays during coffee hour and on performance Sundays. One does not have to be an accomplished musician to join the bell choir, only a desire to learn and to give thanks to the Lord.

Bread Makers: During communion, we offer homemade bread at all our principal services. Using a recipe provided by the Altar Guild, volunteers sign up to bake bread for a month at a time on a rotating basis, bring bread to the church, where it is frozen until needed. This ministry is one in which you can serve from the comfort of your own kitchen and is another easy way for someone to become involved in the life of our parish family.

Greeters: First impressions are lasting impressions, and our greeters are often the first people visitors and church members see at the door before a service. They are there to welcome all and make everyone feel comfortable. They do this with a cheery 'hello', sharing information and directing people to various parts of the building.

Ushers: This ministry is one of hospitality and service. Ushers greet members and visitors in the Narthex and distribute a service bulletin that provides our order of worship and the readings being used. They are there to answer any questions about our service and to guide newcomers as needed. During our Sunday services, in addition to helping with our online broadcast, ushers assist in the liturgy by taking up the weekly collection, bringing the bread and wine forward, preparing the altar rail for communion, guiding parishioners during communion and counting the offering. There are generally two ushers at each service. Often couples or families like to serve as ushers together.

Coffee Hour Teams: This ministry provides snacks after our Sunday morning worship so that both members and guests can get to know one another, catch up on what is happening, and deepen their relationships in Christ. We currently have four teams that provide snacks and clean up the kitchen and parish hall following our 9:30am service. Working as part of a team, and on a rotating basis (typically only once each month), we share in providing a variety of snacks and in cleaning up the kitchen and parish hall afterwards.



PASTORAL CARE

We believe pastoral care is a shared responsibility.

Our clergy are committed to the pastoral care of our community, supported by our loving ministries and lay leaders.

Lay Eucharist Visitors: While clergy are actively engaged in the pastoral care of our parish membership during times of personal crisis, it is the work of our pastoral care teams (also known as Lay Eucharistic Visitors) to help keep members, unable to be part of the day-to-day life of our parish, connected to the community many have been part of much of their lives. Supplementing, not replacing clergy efforts, our teams work with those unable to attend worship, due to health reasons, feel they are still part of the community through regular phone calls, visits, and the sharing of Holy Communion.

Daughters of the King: Daughters of the King is an international lay order of women dedicated to a life of prayer, service and evangelism. Here at CHS, our St. Margaret's chapter maintains the parish prayer chain and is active in support of parish outreach, in providing care packages for our college students and first term military members, in sending note cards that celebrate life's events, and in helping keep the church pew materials neat and orderly. The Daughters of the King chapter are also caretakers of the parish's 27-foot square labyrinth and offers a Labyrinth Day on a Saturday during Lent every year. New members are welcome at any time.

Funeral Receptions: The pastoral care committee works with the priest when a parish or nonparish member passes away. Once the family determines their wishes for the funeral, the pastoral care commissioner plans for refreshments after the funeral service. This ministry is responsible for calling volunteers to help with the reception. The food is primarily donated by church members and is dependent on the time of the service and wishes of the family. Much of the pastoral care budget is used for larger food items such as meat trays or additional food as needed.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION

Christian Education helps provide the formational foundation needed for spiritual growth and is intended to guide our members towards a deeper understanding in, and relationship with, God. To this end we offer a variety of options for all ages:

Adult Formation: Christian formation is a lifelong process of growing in our understanding and relationship with God, ourselves, our neighbors, and all creation. CHS offers weekly Bible study September through May on Wednesday mornings. During the summer months our focus turns towards the study of other cultures and religions.

Education for Ministry: This continuing education program offers instruction in the Old Testament, the New Testament, Church History, and Theology. Sponsored by the University of the South, classes are led by trained parish mentors who guide overlapping groups through this four-year program between September and May. New groups are formed each September.

YOUTH AND CHILDREN

Journey to Adulthood: This formational youth program incorporates learning opportunities of both the church and culture for youth between 6th and 12th grade. Meeting on Wednesday evening, during the school year, our youth, with the help of adult mentors, explore many challenges faced as our youth mature both emotionally and spiritually. Using a building block approach, this program helps our youth to understand how they fit into society and the wider faith community. It also provides youth with the opportunity to understand and define the faith that they can claim as theirs.

This program offers youth many opportunities to exercise leadership and share their gifts and talents through parish ministry involvement and service to others. Youth also participate in many diocesan and national church events such as Camp, Mission Trips, and the national church's triennial Episcopal Youth Event. Our youth lead the Wednesday evening Compline service, as well.



Sunday School: Sunday mornings following the 9:30 service, we offer classes for children from Pre-K through 5th grade. Our curriculum incorporates worship, scripture (bible stories), music, hands-on learning, and teaching about the Episcopal Church. Our staff also provides seasonal craft workshops for both youths and their families. Classes are held upstairs in the south wing. New participants are welcome any time.

Our Sunday school, in partnership with our Journey to Adulthood program, and supported by many others, also puts on a Nativity Play in the month of December and offers Bible School during the summer.













LIFE AT HOLY SPIRIT

Stewardship: Stewardship is an important part of who we are as Christians. Part of being a good steward is using our resources in a way that brings glory to God and caring for that which we have been given. This includes the environment, the church building and grounds, plus the ministry we share. One-way members can contribute to our shared efforts to make a difference in the world around us and to help share how the good news of Christ changes lives, is to participate in our annual stewardship drive. Each fall, our team works with the vestry to identify the needs of both the parish and community, help form a parish budget and engage our members in meeting these needs through the giving of their time, talents, and treasure. We then work with the Vestry to finalize a budget and plan that uses the resources wisely and in accordance with the biblical principles of stewardship. Our ministry is expanding. New members are welcome at any time.

Vestry: The vestry meets monthly to both explore and reinforce the many ways we can support, encourage, and empower our many parish ministries, and to meet their fiduciary responsibilities. New members are elected to the Vestry each year at our annual parish meeting.

Spirit Hub: A recent addition to our parish is our Spirit Hub, where we feature a different ministry weekly and provide education and connection opportunities to those in our parish. We encourage those in our parish to engage with our weekly Spirit Hub host and sign up to become involved in those ministries to which they feel called. Members of ministries in our church have been known to recruit others to join them.

Special events throughout the year bring our parish family together and offer members a chance to share something with friends and family who are not part of our community. Besides our annual parish picnic, our Oktoberfest and Valentine's Extravaganza are two favorites. We also host a Trunk or Treat, a night at the Bellevue Berry Farm, a pie feast on Thanksgiving Eve, and our annual parish meeting.



OUTREACH AT HOLY SPIRIT

Serving the needs of the community is part of who we are and what we do.

Here are a few of the ways in which we strive to do so:

- The Mobile Food Pantry is held nine times a year. It's a drive-through ministry and is held in the CHS parking lot. Throughout the year, the Food bank for the Heartland's mobile pantry comes to CHS. Anyone in need of grocery assistance is welcome to stop by for assistance. Volunteers of all ages are welcome. Set up begins at 9:30 am with food distribution occurring between 10:00 - 11:30 am on select Saturdays.
- CHS members volunteer for delivery assignments for Meals on Wheels.
- CHS supports the Bellevue Food Pantry. Sarpy County residents may receive food Monday to Thursday, distributed in downtown Bellevue.

Support and Assistance to Special Populations:

- Moving Veterans Forward assists homeless veterans with material assistance to move them toward self-sufficiency.
- Bellevue Senior Community Center
- Bellevue Food Pantry
- Magdalene Omaha is a ministry for survivors of sexual violence, abuse, and trafficking. It was started by Rev. Teresa Houser, a deacon of the Diocese of Nebraska.
- Youth Emergency Services (YES) provides housing and services for youth in crisis.
- Plus supporting Eastern Nebraska on Aging with Thanksgiving boxes and Bellevue Together with gift tags for kids at Christmas.

OUTSIDE ORGANIZATIONS

Another way we serve our neighbors is by opening our parish facilities to several community and local groups for their activities and meetings. Our parish hall is also used throughout the year by both our neighbors and parish members for special family functions. Some of the groups that regularly meet at CHS include:

AA (Alcoholic Anonymous): We have two groups that meet in our parish hall. One group meets on Mondays from Noon until 1:00 pm and another on Tuesday evenings from 6:00-7:00 pm. AA is a nonprofessional, self-supporting, multi-racial, apolitical organization and anyone who interested in doing something about their drinking problem is invited to attend.

Al-Anon provides a safe place where people who are worried about someone with a drinking problem can come to find support and answers. We have two groups that meet at CHS; one on Wednesdays from Noon until 1:00 pm, and the other on Wednesday evenings from 7:30 until 8:30 pm. Al-Anon is a mutual support program for people whose lives have been affected by someone else's drinking.

Scouting America Troop 483 is sponsored by the church and has been meeting in our parish hall on Monday evenings from 6:00-7:30 PM for many years. Scouts participate in four of the nine Mobile Food Pantries at the church and assist in our Spring and Fall Clean-up efforts. New scouts are always welcome.

Cub Scout Pack 483 holds their monthly committee meetings in the parish hall the second Tuesday evening of the month beginning at 7:15 as well as various Pack functions. The Pack holds its Den Meetings weekly at the nearby Twin Ridge Elementary School on Monday evenings from 6:00-7:00 pm. The Pack participates in four of the nine Mobile Pantries at the church and assists in our Spring and Fall Clean-up efforts.

Green Bellevue are people coming together to work, with the support of our city leaders, to promote a more beautiful and environmentally friendly community. Green Bellevue helps individuals and groups undertake programs to enhance neighborhoods, preserve our natural resources and foster stewardship of our environment.

Missions and Pilgrimages


- Dominican Republic (DR): The Diocese of Nebraska has an ongoing relationship with missions in the DR and has ongoing trips to assist with needed projects, including labor for refurbishing chapels, churches, and church grounds.
- Parishioners have participated in trips to the Holy Land and are planning a pilgrimage to early Scottish and Irish abbeys and other religious sites.
- Youth Mission Trips to South Dakota reservations offer work assistance and Vacation Bible School for reservation children.
- CHS youth traveled to visit Noah's Ark and the Creation Museum in Ohio and Kentucky.

CHURCH HISTORY

The mission church of "The Church of the Holy Spirit" (CHS) had its first meeting on July 2, 1961, in the historic Presbyterian Church in downtown Bellevue, NE. with a congregation of 177 in attendance. The use of the building and the insurance were a gift to the new congregation. The congregation would be responsible for any changes to the Sanctuary and recurring expenses. In April 1966, construction began on a new church on the present day site. The first service in the new building was Christmas Eve, 1966. The Sunday School wing was added in 1979. In 1976, CHS went from mission status to a parish.

Over the past 63 years CHS has had six full time priests, several associate priests, interims, and deacons. The church was active in the diocesan intern program, many who went on to seminary and became ordained. Two of our priests have served CHS for 12 or more years before retiring.

CHS is close to Offutt AFB. Many of the people in our congregation are active duty or retired military personnel and their families. Most of our congregation live in the cities of Bellevue, Papillion, or Plattsmouth.

BELLEVUE & ITS ENVIRONMENT

Bellevue (French for "beautiful view") is a suburban city in Sarpy County Nebraska immediately south of Omaha. Established in 1822 as a fur-trading post, it is the state's oldest settlement and was an important missionary center and agency of the Otoe, Pawnee, and Omaha tribes. It moved its site in 1835 to the bluffs overlooking the river valley and became a center of trade between the eastern and western United States. The state's first newspaper, the Nebraska Palladium, was published there in 1854. It served as county seat from 1857 to 1875. An 1830s log cabin and the Fontenelle Bank, once used as the city hall (1856), are preserved.

Bellevue is part of the Omaha-Council Bluffs metropolitan area and had a population of 64,176 as of the 2020 census, making it the 3rd largest city in Nebraska. It is bounded by the Missouri River, the Platte River, and Papillion, NE. Highway 75 runs North/South through the city. The Bellevue schools are noted to be very good. Bellevue is the home of Bellevue University. The largest employer in the area is the United States Air Force at Offutt Air Force Base. Bellevue's economy is now based on military services, defense contracting, printing, and the manufacture of wool products.



Omaha was founded in 1854. Omaha has always been a dynamic, energetic city continually transforming itself. Whether it was the Native American Indian tribes, pioneers, railroad laborers or meat packers, everyone who came to call Omaha home helped shape its current cultural diversity, hard work ethic, and friendly demeanor. Named after an American Indian Tribe, Omaha means "Those going against the wind or current." Omahans proudly continue to live up to the name.

Omaha is the largest city in Nebraska, and the 42nd largest city in the United States. The metropolitan area is home to over 900,000 people who welcome visitors with open arms and authentic Midwestern hospitality. The city has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the country, 3.1%. Gender ratios are 99 males to 100 females. Nebraska was ranked the 5th most affordable state to live in by US News and World Report.



THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NEBRASKA

The Episcopal Diocese of Nebraska is made up of 52 churches located all over the Cornhusker state (77,000 square miles), where diverse communities of people gather to encourage and support each other in worshiping Jesus, nurture each other through good times and bad, and reach out in service to the larger world. We are part of the larger Episcopal Church, which is in turn a member of the world-wide Anglican Communion.

"Our Nebraska parish families are diverse —each local church a treasured member of the larger body of Christ. Those of you who work and travel throughout our state have some sense of the astonishing variety of church communities that dot our landscape from Chadron to Falls City, from Creighton to Kimball. Our churches are set in bustling urban neighborhoods and on quiet, small-town back streets. We're in big, fancy, stone structures, and tiny, humble, pioneer meeting houses. Our members are men and women, young and old, and hail from dozens of ethnic and racial groups. We inhabit every possible rung on the socio-economic ladder, we identify as gay, straight, bi-sexual and transgendered and we will vote on November 4th for candidates of every conceivable political persuasion. It would be a mistake —more accurately I would say a betrayal—to imagine that we are alike. We are not all alike. We are rather a quite wonderful cross-section of the diversity of God's much greater and much beloved human creation.
