



Our team leader meeting last month spent some time looking over the remaining calendar of events for this year, and looked ahead to next. Computer Ministry

What does the computer ministry do? The computer ministry keeps the computers up to date with all Microsoft Updates and does routine scans once or twice a month on all of the church's computers (6). Maintains the church's WiFi which is nothing more than restarting the Cox modem and the two wifi stations in the event of a power outage (Usually Fr. Tom can do this if it happens during normal church times).

Since we have updated the computers in the last few years and went to a simple home wifi setup there is very little time needed to maintain the church's computers. Here is a list of what I do?


- 1. I update the Windows Updates roughly once or twice a month. Usually if I have to update my home computer I try to update the church's computers within a week or two. It usually takes less than 1 to 2 hours to get all of them done.
- 2. I try and do Virus scans on all the computers once a quarter using the Windows Defender quick scan if no problems develop. This usually takes less than 2 hours (all computers can be done at the same time). If anything is found the Windows Defender will give you options to remove or quarantine, generally they are removed.



- 3. Maintaining the WiFi system. Unplug the Cox modem, and the two WiFi routers waiting 30 seconds or so and plugging them back in the same order as you unplugged them. This happens very rarely unless there is a power outage. If you maintain a home WiFi router then this is the same.
- 4. All the information needed to perform these tasks you probably are already doing maintaining your home computers.

The reason I have went into such detail is I am not going to be around much anymore since I have retired. So I am looking for someone who might be interested in learning more about how the church's systems work. If interested in maybe finding out more about this ministry then talk to Fr. Tom and we can get together and see if you would like to be involved in the Computer Ministry.


